Brief History: Mrs. Eaves was designed in 1996 by Zuzana Licko. She was inspired by Baskerville, which was created in 1757 in Birmingham, England, by John Baskerville. Baskerville wanted to push the contrast between thick and thin strokes in his typefaces to show off new printing and paper making techniques of the time. Because of this, his Baskerville font and others were heavily criticized for being unbalanced and the strokes being too thin and "perfect" (Fonts).

Licko worked with her partner Rudy VanderLans to found a font distributing business called "Émigré Graphics." It "accommodate[s] pioneering typefaces by a broad group of designers and artists," and is now one of the top font distributors in the world (Creative Characters). Licko acts as the curator for Emigré Graphics. Mrs Eaves has outsold all Emigre fonts.

She discovered Baskerville while studying type in the Bancroft library at the University of California. She wanted to adapt the Baskerville type because she said she could "sympathize, from personal experiences what it was like to have your work criticized by all your peers and critics." She based her design on printed samples of Baskerville, because they were heavier and had more character due to "imprint of lead type into paper and the resulting ink spread" (Mrs Eaves from Emigre).

Most Common Uses: Mrs Eaves is good for use in display contexts because the low x height and combined unusual characters and ligatures. Mrs Eaves is most commonly found in literary contexts, adorning book covers and blurbs on dust covers. When originally released in the 90s, it went viral and appeared everywhere, such as on junk mail and websites. It is thought to have inspired curlique typefaces in early 2000s Paris Vogue and Rolling Stones magazines.






I tried to show how Mrs Eaves is a beautiful, quirky, and curlique font. I made a page that displays the ligatures, the history of the font and its use in literary books.








Refined Sketches


I enlarged my thumbnails and drew them in the dimensions for the finished book, I refined the sketches and moved some things around.
















Computer Roughs

I began translating the sketches to Adobe InDesign. I played around with the cover and making it look like the "M" stopped to pick the flower. It isn't reading too clearly yet.














Computer Roughs Development

I had so much trouble coming up with a front and back cover. I ended up using an idea from my earlier thumbnails, where the "g" looks like a watering can. I plan to revisit this in the future. I also fixed minor things in each spread, and moved everything further from the gutters and margins.

I plan to play a lot with the position, opacity, scale, rotate, and color changing features in AfterEffects. The frames I created reflect the color palette and flowery asterisk theme in my type specimen book. In the last frame, I want the ligatures to grow when the rain hits them.

History

Mrs Eaves is a transitional serif typeface designed by Zuzana Licko in 1996. It is an adaption of Baskerville, which is criticized for being unbalanced and having too much contrast between thick and thin strokes. Licko based the font on printed samples of the Baskerville font because they are heavier and have more character due to the spread of ink on the paper. The typeface is named "Mrs Eaves" after John Baskerville's wife,

Sarah Eaves, who helped him to print and set type.
